T-Loop Hearing Assistance



Invocation

We begin the season of Lent today in the name of the Father and of the \dotplus Son and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

Introduction to Lent

In the far reaches of eternity the Son of God accepted His role in the divine plan to free human creatures from the power of Satan, sin, and death. God announced this plan at the closed gates of the Garden when He outlined the confrontation between the Seed and the serpent. God arranged for the plan as He selected a human ancestry for His Son and predicted the plan in the writings of the prophets. With this plan in mind, the God-man Jesus walked into the waters of the Jordan to be baptized and was led into the wilderness to face the devil's temptations. This was the plan He shared with his followers. When they confessed their faith in Him, "he then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again" (Mark 8:31). Although the disciples did not fully understand the plan. Jesus understood the plan perfectly and knew that the plan was central in His life and the life of the world. A week before His death, Jesus said, "Now my soul is troubled, and what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it was for this very reason I came to this hour" (John 12:27).

Not until after the outpouring of the Spirit on Pentecost did Jesus' followers grasp the full meaning of the master's suffering, death, and resurrection. Then, fully understanding and firmly believing, they carried out the Savior's command to preach the gospel to every creature. Joined by Paul and many more, they proclaimed in temple courts and on dusty roads, in public squares and private homes, in palaces and prisons the forgiveness of sins gained by Jesus' passion and guaranteed by His resurrection.

Confession & Absolution

Brothers and sisters in Christ, God created us to know joy in fellowship with Him, to love all people, and to live in harmony with all creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. By our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under His judgment, but to turn to Him and live. Therefore, God in his mercy has sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take our place under the law, to suffer for us, and to die the death we deserve. God made Jesus, who had no sin, to be sin for us so that in Him, we might become the righteousness of God.

During the forty days of Lent, we fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God. The time of Lent reminds us that to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in His sufferings, becoming like Him in his death. As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor.

Let us confess our sins, asking our Heavenly Father for forgiveness, and commit ourselves once again to this struggle.

Most holy and merciful Father,

we confess to you and to one another that we have sinned by our own fault,

by our own grievous fault in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart and mind and strength.

We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

Have mercy on us, Lord.

We have been deaf to your call to serve as Christ served us.

We have not been true to the mind of Christ.

We have grieved the Holy Spirit.

Have mercy on us, Lord.

We have placed our wants before your will.

We have gratified the desires of our sinful nature.

We have merited your punishment now and forever.

Have mercy on us, Lord.

We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness.

The pride, hypocrisy, and impatience in our lives

we confess to you, O Lord.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, our manipulation of other people, our anger when our selfish aims are denied, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves

we confess to you, O Lord.

Our love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work, our negligence in worship and prayer, and our failure to show the faith that is in us

we confess to you, O Lord.

Forgive us, Lord, for the wrongs we have done. For our blindness to human need and suffering and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,


forgive us, Lord.

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward others, and for our prejudice and contempt for those who differ from us, forgive us, Lord.

For whatever we think or say or do that is at variance with your will, forgive us, Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us. **Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great.**



Do not make your inheritance an object of scorn, a byword among the nations.



¹³Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me."




Lift up your hearts.

Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.


